Ugadale Hotel opens for business after major restoration

'The next phase is to improve the air, road and ferry links'

THE 'painstaking' restoration of the Ugadale Hotel has finally been completed and its reopening celebrated on

The hotel at Machrihanish in Kintyre was officially re-opened by their Graces, the Duke and Duchess of Argyll, Michael Russell MSP and David Southworth of Southworth Development LLC 'We are thrilled with

the results of the painstaking restoration process and look forward to celebrating the return of this iconic, turn-ofthe-century hotel, which will bring a new standard of accommodation to the region,' said David Southworth, president and CEO of Southworth Development LLC.

To coincide with the hotel reopening the Kintyre Club was reinstated, with Brian Keating, founder and director of Kintyre Development Company, announced as its first president.

Curator of social history and art at Campbeltown Museum, Bob Clark, presented the original Kintyre Club horn, which was used previously to bring the guests and members to order. Invited guests wit-

nessed the official opening of the hotel at a special reception with the Machrihanish Dunes Pipe Band performing at the ceremony.

Willy Roe CBE, chairman of Highlands and Islands Enterprise attended and paid tribute to the work of Southworth Development and the money it has injected into Kintyre's economy.

HIE invested £2.2million into the project, as well as further money into the Royal Hotel and Machrihanish Dunes Golf development.

'They are going to be one of the best and biggest employers in Kintyre giving people complete new opportunities at the top end of the hospitality industry,' said Mr Roe.

Brian Keating told The Courier: 'This is world class golf and world class hospitality. The next phase over the next few years is to improve the air, road and ferry links. I would like to get an air link directly from Prestwick to Campbeltown; it is only an 11-minute flight. We need to improve all this to get more people coming to

Councillor John Semple said he firmly believes that Southworth's redevelopment of this hotel and the Royal in Campbeltown has the potential to change the fortunes of

South Kintyre. 'For local businesses to take advantage, they will need to have the confidence to invest, and fundamental to that will be better transport links into Kintyre,' he said.

Argyll First Councillor Donald Kelly, having been involved from the outset working with Brian Keating to ensure the golf course project was brought to fruition, said he is pleased to support Southworth Development with its hotel and property ventures.

'I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate them on the reopening of the Ugadale,'

History of the hotel

IN 1895 a small guesthouse opened at Machrihanish, which overlooked the famed first tee of Machrihanish Golf

It was known as the Pans Hotel and was frequented by golfers and the Scottish 'elite'. Shortly, after the ho-

Shortly after the hotel expanded and a program of renovations was made.

However an unfortunate fire, thought to have started in the chimney, ravaged the wooden expansion of the hotel in 1898, gutting the building.

The hotel reopened as the Ugadale Arms Hotel and was soon regarded as the pinnacle of luxury accommodation in the west of Scotland. The Ugadale Arms, in its heyday, regularly welcomed captains of

welcomed captains of industry and their families, who descended on Machrihanish for the summer holidays.

The hotel continued to provide extraordinary service.

It eventually closed its doors to the public in the late 1990s.

The Ugadale Hotel has been lovingly restored to reclaim its former glory, with 22 luxurious guest rooms and suits, the reinstatement of Kintyre Club private restaurant and Serenity Spa based at the Ugadale.

Facts and figures

THE Royal Hotel in Campbeltown is also going through a restoration process by Southworth Development and is due to be officially opened on May 12.

THE project is owned by The Kintyre Development Company, operated by Southworth Development LLC, and Machrihanish Investors.

ONCE the Village at Machrihanish Dunes project has been completed, it is estimated more than 150 full-time hospitality-related jobs will be created.

THE ongoing operations of the project are estimated to bring in more than £3million to the economy annually.

□SOUTHWORTH Europe has invested more than £30million in the overall project, with £2.2million from Highlands and Islands and Islands European Regional Development Fund. In addition to this, HE provided a grant totalling £509,606 for the development of Machrihanish Dunes Golf Course, which opened in 2008.

Innovation is a feature of the garden - notably the new bird and butterfly feeders positioned on trees and observed by unobtrusive state of the art cameras, streaming direct onto screens in the cosy, well-appointed hide nearby.
